5th National Research Symposium

The 5th Annual LSMAMP National Research Symposium was held on October 6th and 7th, 2008, at Jackson State

University in the e-Center. Students and coordinators from the eight Mississippi sites, along with students and faculty from Fayetteville State University and Howard University, joined together for a day and a half of keynote speeches and presentations about opportunities for graduate study and research internships at academic institutions and in industry. The Symposium Committee received ninety (105) abstracts this year and students gave oral and poster presentations of their research on both days.

Keynote Speakers



of 2003, the first Cohort of the Bridge to the Doctorate Program began their studies within the Louis Stokes Mississippi Alliance for Minority Participation at Jackson State University (JSU.) Of the ten (10)individuals who began the program, four (4) have achieved their doctorate degrees and the other six (6) are well on their way to completing the requirements for the Ph.D. at their respective institutions.

Ph.D.'s Achieved

The first of the Cohort to earn her Ph.D. was Tomekia Simeon (pictured at left.) Dr. Simeon was awarded her degree in May of 2008 from JSU in the field of Computational Chemistry and is now working at Jackson State University. The next to attain her degree at JSU was Charity Mosley in August of 2008 in the area of Forensic Chemistry. Dr, Mosley is working with the U.S. Drug Enforcement Agency in Dallas, Texas. In December of 2008, both Brian Napolion and Eric McClendon received their degrees in Organic Chemistry, also at JSU. Dr. Napolion is serving in a post-doctorate position in the Department of Physics, Atmospheric Sciences and Geoscience at JSU. Dr. McClendon is attending medical school at the University of Mississippi Medical Center.




