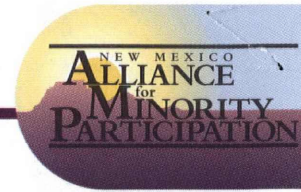

What is the New Mexico Alliance for Minority Participation?

The New Mexico Alliance is

- a partnership of New Mexico's two-year and four-year colleges and universities
- a National Science Foundation (NSF) sponsored program
- one of 25 NSF alliances nationally

Who is it for?

It is designed for undergraduate ethnic minority students (Hispanic, African-American, American-Indian, Alaskan Native, Pacific Islander) majoring in

- science, mathematics, engineering, or technology
- math or science education
- social and behavioral sciences

How can New Mexico AMP help me?

For **high school seniors**, New Mexico AMP can provide scholarships after graduation to make the transition to college easier.

For **college undergraduates**, New Mexico AMP has

- summer bridge programs which offer study skills workshops, field trips to career-related facilities, and tutoring

- peer tutoring, study groups, science and math clubs, computer-assisted classroom programs, distance learning, well-equipped laboratories, and academic and career counseling
- opportunities to attend or present research work at professional conferences

Anything else?

Other kinds of support may include

- internships
- work-study programs
- book scholarships
- emergency loans
- research assistantships
- transfer assistance

What kind of transfer assistance?

- articulation agreements which allow you to take many of your general education courses at a two-year school close to home and transfer those credits to a four-year institution to complete your B.S. degree
