## Key Topics:

- Update of CO-AMP Activities & Programs (El-Hakim)
  - Review of handouts
  - Total amount of students impacted by CO-AMP activities and programs from January to September is 1,116
- Importance of Governing Board (Harper)
  - Program activities in place and supported
  - More than lip service from the institutions
  - Funding, (NSF & matching)
  - Distribution of funding as based on future numbers of students
  - Institutional programs as on-going efforts for continued and expanded success
- Report of Task Force one Significance to CO-AMP (Smith)
  - Dedicated to interaction with industry, government laboratories, and foundations in the establishment of programs and funding
  - Two items established since first Task Force Meeting on May 9, 1997
    - A road map by which CO-AMP students can easily find internships and job opportunities with the companies and government laboratories collaborating with CO-AMP
    - Development of collaborative proposals to industry from the 11 CO-AMP institutions together rather than separately
- Colorado Commission on Higher Education (CCHE)(Nuzum)
  - CCHE supports CO-AMP and its goals
  - Urged CO-AMP to submit a proposal for the Program of Excellence, due in January, 1998; which will help institutionalize CO-AMP activities and programs after NSF runs out
- Site Reports by individual campuses and tribal representatives
  - CSU, CCD, Dine, FLC, PCC, TSJC, UC-Boulder, UC-Denver, USC were represented. Dr. Joan Foster of MSCD had to leave before presenting. No representative from FRCC.
  - Navajo Nation was represented by Mr. Tom Atcitty
- General Comments of Note
  - Need for strong support between the 2 year and 4 year colleges (Harper)
  - Need to clarify available funding for students transferring from 2 year to 4 year colleges
  - Need to clarify articulation agreements between 2 year and 4 year colleges
  - Need to develop an introductory "How to Use the Library" course for entering freshmen (Byyny)
  - Need for a possible resolution between tribes and Colorado schools for "in-state" tuition (Atcitty)-the Navajo Nation currently have one with the states of New Mexico, Arizona, and Utah)
  - Need to get industry strongly involved with programs and activities as partners (Tapia)
  - Need to work with Social and Behavioral Science students beginning in January, 1998 (utilizing no more than 20% of funds) (El-Hakim)
  - Need to work with professional societies to develop student databases (request to work with AISES to develop a Native American one) (Matis)
